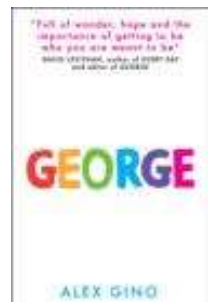
The Art of Being Normal by Lisa Williamson

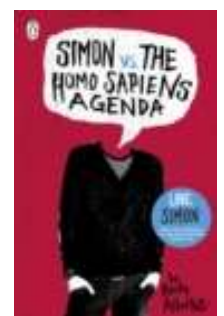
Gracefully Grayson by Ami Polonski

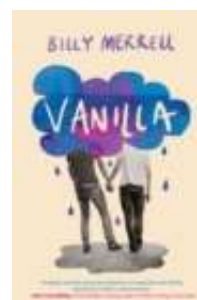
The Love and Lies of Rukhsana Ali by Sabina Khan
